"There is Good News Tonight

The following Address was given at the Opening Banquet of the 2007 Grand York Rite Sessions in Bakersfield, California

Good evening Brethren, Companions, Knights, Ladies and Guests:

It is my pleasure to join with you for this Grand York Rite Session.

This year the Grand Master's Emblem has substantial significance to our craft.

Freemasonry recognizes as its first priority that each man has a responsibility of devotion to his family, flag and fraternity; and in that sequence of importance. The emphasis of these three words is displayed in the emblem by the silhouette of the family with a background of red, white and blue denoting patriotism to the flag of our county with the symbol of Masonry in its traditional blue background.

The term "family" is used not only to refer to wives, widows and children of freemasons, it also denotes the "Family of Freemasonry" through its appendant and concordant organizations and youth orders, which should cooperate, enhance and extend the hand of fraternalism to each other.

I am cognizant of the old adage that those who speak least, are the most appreciated. I will abide by those words this evening.

A continuing theme this year is one used by a 1940's radio commentator, Gabriel Heater, who would begin his newscasts with the words: "There's Good News. Tonight!"

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If Masonry is Good, Let's Talk About It!

Most Worshipful GM Melvyn Stein, Most Excellent General Grand High Priest Larry Gray; Grand Officers of the Grand Lodge and Grand York Rite Bodies, Brothers, Sisters, and guests. Good Evening.

First, I want to thank all of you for being here, (I see so many from San Diego County) and sharing this evening with me and my Grand Family, as we embark upon another Year of Royal Arch Masonry in California.

As I begin my journey as the 153rd Grand High Priest, I think of the others who preceded me, and what thoughts they had as they ascended to the position of occupying this time-honored Oriental Chair. I think of our Masonic Fraternity, and where we are today. I think of Royal Arch Masonry, and where we are going. In doing this, I realize that we must face the new, but very pleasant challenges of the future - the renewed interest in Freemasonry.

We are seeing this renewed interest, not only in our Blue Lodges, but also in the Scottish Rite and the York Rite. Now, many of our Lodges are having an unprecedented number of applications and degrees. We in the Royal Arch are also having larger numbers of applicants at many of our festivals, and we are seeing a lot more younger men joining our Fraternity.

Nearly half a century ago, Grand Orator Ted Meriam, (GM in 64), addressed the Grand Lodge of California, and stated: "If Masonry is good, let's talk about it."

In 1995, Most Worshipful Charlie Alexander, Grand Master of Masons in California chose for his theme: The Heritage of the Past - the Challenge of the Future. He stated that, We have a right as Masons to be proud of our past,

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but it should not be an escape from facing the challenges of the future. The Theme chosen in 1997 by MW Tony Wordlow was Masonry United - an Indelible Impression. In 2000, MW David Decker chose - Freemasonry, the Cornerstone of the new Millennium. This year MW Grand Master Mel Stein has for his Theme: Family, Flag & Freemasonry. Other Grand Masters, and other Grand High Priests have also embraced togetherness, unity, and have worked for the betterment of our Fraternity.

While both Ted Meriam and Charlie Alexander were looking at Freemasonry with eyes that were seeing a decrease in membership, both seemed to see that we still needed to retain quality. Today, their view is as relevant as ever. "If Masonry is good, let's talk about it."

"If Royal Arch Masonry is good, let's talk about it."

Let's look at what we are doing good in Royal Arch Masonry. Let's look at our only market - The Blue Lodge. Let's face the new, but very pleasant challenges of the future - the renewed interest in Freemasonry. Let's promote Royal Arch Masonry.

With this renewed interest comes the challenge of retaining those Royal Arch Masons in our Chapters. We need to give all our members something for their time and money. We need to do something that interests them. We need to provide them with Royal Arch Masonic Education. We need to look at what we are doing well in Royal Arch Masonry and continue it, while looking at things that haven't worked and discontinue them. Some Chapters and Lodges have pot luck dinners and family nights which go over very well. One Companion in particular, EC and Past Master Bob Harrell of Escondido has been doing short Masonic Education talks for years. Bob, I know you are in the audience, and I thank you for your service to the Fraternity and our friendship for over 25 years.

My Emphasis will be our relationship to the Blue Lodge. That is where our membership market lies. This is where our legacy, or our heritage begins. That is where our Landmarks were first developed.

When I look at my Masonic heritage, and landmarks, I see this gavel which I used as Master of Vista Lodge in 1986 & 1997. I see this Top Hat from my mother Chapter, Tyre Chapter No. 130 in Escondido. And, I see the Bible on the altar which comes from Triangle Chapter No. 155 in Vista where I served as High Priest. One other bit of my heritage was my Marine Corps Mamaluke Sword, used by the Grand Sentinel when he was installed.

The Lapel pin for this year is the Triple-Tau of Royal Arch and the Square and compass of Freemasonry. (The pin was designed by Companion Roger Poynts, a member of Oakland and Doric Chapters.) From that Lapel Pin, you can readily see that I feel a close relationship between the Blue Lodge and the Royal Arch. As you look at each of the Grand Chapter Officers who were installed this evening you can be assured that nearly everyone of them is a Past Master of his Lodge, and most are Hiram Award Recipients. There are even three beloved Blue Lodge Inspectors.

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My brethren, there is, good news today!, about Masonry in California.

First: the average age of newly made Master Masons in California is only 39.5 years!

Younger men are joining, and it's up to you to provide them with further "Light in Masonry."

Secondly: in 2006 California received more applicants and performed more degrees than in any year in the last 16 years.

Third: the millennium generation is also knocking on our doors. They represent those born since 1981. They seek the "Masonic Philosophy of Life" and desire to learn how they can apply it to their daily activities.

Listen to them!

Nurture them!

Respect them!

Make them feel a sense of belonging!;

Most importantly of all, impart to them as soon as possible, the meaning of the degrees and symbols and the truths within our hidden allegories, so that they can apply them to their daily lives. We will thus fulfill our promise to all men who enter our gates: "to make good men better."

Masonry is on the move in California, and you are part of it; and yes, **there is good news, tonight!**

Just as the Cornerstone is a significant sign in Craft Freemasonry, the Keystone is a significant sign of Royal Arch Masonry. I hope to build upon some of the things that Junior PGHP Russ Roberts has promoted regarding the Keystone which was his lapel pin.

The Grand Chapter has various awards that can be presented to Companions for their service to Royal Arch Masonry. However, I could find no Award that could be presented to a non-Royal Arch Mason. I felt that there needed to be some way to recognize those who have given of their time and talents to Freemasonry (regardless of their association with Royal Arch) such as: wives, Youth leaders, Blue Lodge Brethren. Anyone, including Companions, deserving of recognition for their outstanding efforts supporting Freemasonry. We decided to name it, The Keystone Award, and your Grand Chapter has adopted it. I will begin presenting Keystone Awards at Receptions and Official Visits this year.

Finally, I am reminded of a passage of ritual in the Blue Lodge which is recited by the Senior Warden at the opening and closing of Lodge -

"Harmony being the strength and support of all societies, especially of ours". Please, Let harmony prevail. Thank you.

"I CAN NEVER ACHIEVE WHAT WE CAN ACHIEVE TOGETHER"

Companions, ladies and friends, the subject of this year's grand oration is our Grand High Priest's theme for his year in the East - "I can never achieve what we can achieve together."

When Most Excellent Companion Russ Roberts asked me to put together an oration based upon his theme, I naturally went to my Masonic library for ideas and guidance. In one book, entitled *Freemasonry: A Journey through Ritual and Symbol* by Kirk MacNulty, was a section entitled "Approaches to Masonic Labor." In it, the author describes three doorways to inner knowledge: 1) action; 2) devotion, and; 3) contemplation. Since the task before me was Masonic in nature, I thought it might be interesting to offer my thoughts from these three different perspectives.

Action is a common-sense approach, which immediately springs to mind. There are so many ways that we can work together to build Freemasonry into a stronger edifice. The four that I will deal with here are mentoring, organization, ritual, and addressing challenges.

Mentoring is a task that is essential to provide newly exalted Royal Arch Masons with a sense of the traditions, customs and standards of the Chapter they have joined. Past High Priests, in particular, should offer suggestions to new officers and members on leadership skills, administration, and ritual. Some older Companions may feel that it's not their place to speak up, but I can assure you that most new Royal Arch Companions will not only appreciate and benefit from the advice, but will be more inclined to feel that what they're doing really matters, and is important to the members of their chapter.

Organization takes many forms in a Royal Arch Chapter. Of course, there is the hierarchy of officers, but many other elements must be in place if things are to operate efficiently and smoothly. Good communication is absolutely essential. Dates for degree conferrals should be included not only in the monthly bulletin, but in flyers distributed at stated convocations, posted to the Grand York Rite web site, and communicated to other York Rite organizations. If you're not already doing so, why not send notices of your conferral dates to the secretaries of your local blue lodges? Dais officers should undertake the scheduling of activities and conferrals for the succeeding capitular year in the fall, coordinate with the officers of the other York Rite and Masonic organizations, and thereby avoid scheduling conflicts. Planning the calendar for the coming year well in advance, and communicating important dates to all of the Companions, will increase attendance and participation.

Scheduling joint activities with other York Rite bodies is one way that a High Priest can economize, when his budget is a limiting factor.

The role of ritual in establishing a strong bond with new members, and contributing to membership growth is sometimes underestimated. Typically, the first real experience that a candidate has with a Royal Arch Chapter is his reception of the capitular degrees. The quality of the ritual work done at his conferral will form his first impression of his Chapter. If the ritual is well done, he will feel that the members of his Chapter have pride in their organization, and that they care enough about their new members and the message contained in the ritual to do their best. He will then feel pride in being a member, and be more likely to encourage his brother Masons to join. If, on the other hand, the ritual is poorly done, he'll probably feel that he made a mistake in joining, will discourage his brother Masons from petitioning, and be less likely to attend meetings and get involved.

The challenges our Chapters face are many - the ones I hear most often relate to declining membership and declining participation. The irony is that while these are two of our biggest challenges, they are also the ones that every single Royal Arch Mason can assist in correcting. It's easy - all our Companions need to do is get involved. They can participate in the activities of their Chapter and its ritual, or encourage a member of their blue lodge to petition to take the capitular degrees. And every Companion can help to make new members feel welcome, by introducing themselves and extending the hand of friendship.

Another challenge is the frustration and burnout that some Companions experience as they take on more and greater responsibility in their Chapters - often more than they can reasonably handle. Unfortunately, this can sometimes lead to impatience with other Companions whose contribution may superficially appear to be lacking. This is only natural, but we must resist the temptation to judge our fellow Royal Arch Companions too harshly. Such thoughts and words destroy the harmony of our organization. It must be remembered that many of our members wear many hats, and contribute to the health and success of our fraternity in ways that may not be obvious to many of our members. In addition, we all have non-Masonic obligations of family and work. Admonition and reproof should be offered when appropriate, but encouragement, praise and

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thanks should never be in short supply for those who are doing their part to keep their Chapters strong.

Devotion is another way of approaching our theme - and not only in the form of prayer. Acts of charity, and service to the less fortunate not only serve as outward manifestations of the principles we espouse as Royal Arch Masons, but they help to unite us in a common cause - the betterment of all mankind. Such actions can only help to broaden the appeal of Freemasonry.

Contemplation might seem like a very personal and private pursuit, and therefore unrelated to our theme. However, contemplation leads us to reflect upon the hidden meaning of our symbols, which leads in turn to an awakening to who we are, and ultimately, enlightenment. This spiritual progression inevitably deepens the mystic tie that binds us together as Freemasons. Consider, for example, the keystone - sometimes referred to as the capestone or copestone. One definition of the word keystone from the Oxford English Dictionary is "the central principle of a system...upon which all the rest depends." A copestone is defined as "The top or head stone of a building; almost always figuratively the crown, completion, finishing touch." From our ritual, we learn that the builders initially rejected the keystone, because they did not appreciate its value or understand its use. The keystone symbolically represents the unique but unappreciated contribution of the architect - his life's work - and is absolutely essential for the completion of the temple. In the same way, our unique contribution is essential, not only in completing the mystic temple of our own lives, but also in the spiritual house, not made with hands, eternal in the heavens. Knowing this, we should guard against being too quick to reject the work of another Mason. Without the participation and involvement of every Companion, the work will remain unfinished, and the mystic temple will never be completed.

John Donne wrote that "No man is an island, entire of itself; every man is a piece of the continent, a part of the main. If a clod be washed away by the sea, Europe is the less, as well as if promontory were, as well as if a manor of thy friend's or of thine own were. Any man's death diminishes me, because I am involved in mankind; and therefore never send to know for whom the bell tolls; it tolls for thee." We must reject the illusion that we are separate individuals, and be reborn to the enlightened view that mankind is of one essence. As Royal Arch Masons, we must understand and live by this principle if we are ever to realize the dream of a true brotherhood of all mankind.

Chaplain's Corner

Early in 1955 I began the long class of education and instruction and received the 32nd Degree in May of that year. Long Beach Scottish Rite is the only Masonic Body which still meets in the same place and same time as when I began my travels. I have supported Long Beach Scottish Rite with love and appreciation, joined by my wife, Grace, over thirty years ago, but receiving this appointment, after so long a wait, is a joyful and humbling experience.

In 1982 I was appointed Chaplain for another Valley. It was only four years old so we could make history rather than conform to an established tradition. Our idea was to create a Chaplaincy which would serve all the Brethren and Families, helping them with their own belief system and Faith tradition. In this setting, the Chaplain, and his team, would address spiritual matters for the membership when there were no leaders available from their own Faith group. We addressed the challenges and demands of sickness, death, alcoholism, and short term family counseling. Most of us in the Valley have our own resources for these issues, and a Spiritual Home, but some do not, so a "Chaplaincy" concept may be helpful.

In Masonry the Chaplain often recites ritual prayers and gives written or free prayers before meals. In many lodges the Chaplain is given a place on the Sickness and Visitation Committee, but that is the end of it. I believe that Masonry, especially Scottish Masonry, should help every member to be better informed, more deeply involved within his Religious Faith. The "dumbing down" of Faith in to the lowest common denominator should not be our way of life. Hopefully, the Chaplaincy Program will encourage and support every member of the Valley as they seek to follow the God of their understanding.

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HOW DOES FREEMASONRY ADD VALUE TO OUR LIVES?

Undoubtedly, the most visible benefit associated with Freemasonry is the friendship, morality, and Brotherly Love we learn simply by attending Lodge and interacting with the members. It is not unusual for Freemasons to develop lifelong friendships and bonds with other Masons. This should not be surprising as the fraternity represents a society consisting of men with common interests, and such commonality is comforting to us all.

Aside from this, how does Freemasonry add value to our lives? Frankly, there are several subliminal ways we are affected personally and professionally by our participation in the fraternity; some examples:

Socialization Skills - through the structured decorum of our formal meetings and the informality of others, we learn to respect, cooperate, participate and network with people. In other words, it influences our behavior in terms of how we interact with our neighbors, friends, coworkers, customers and vendors. This tends to make us more socially adjusted and proactive in our communities and companies.

Speaking and Memorization Skills - our catechisms and degree work, although trying at times, help sharpen our brains as well as our tongues. Although our terminology may seem somewhat archaic, it is useful for improving one's vocabulary. Further, returning catechisms, and delivering degrees and lectures helps overcome the human fear of audiences and materially assists in making us better public speakers, something that is particularly needed in our professional lives regardless of our occupation.

Dress - Again, because of the decorum of our meetings, we learn the value of dressing appropriately to cultivate a positive image. I have met several Brothers who have cleaned up their act simply by their association with the fraternity, thereby turning a slovenly image into one that is more positive and professional.

Organization & Leadership - For those members who become Lodge officers, it is not uncommon to learn basic organization and leadership skills, such as: planning and scheduling, managing records and finances, building maintenance, communications and persuasion, etc. All of this is useful to us in both our personal and professional lives.

History - as the world's oldest fraternal organization, we impress the need for customs and traditions on all of our members. But beyond this, many Masons become fascinated with our history and learn to research and write on

a variety of subjects related to the fraternity. Masons, therefore, appreciate the lessons of history and develop effective writing skills which also help us in the outside world.

Volunteerism - our philanthropy is legendary and it is impressed on every Mason to help others as generously as their ability permits. Aside from the moneys we donate, Masons learn to volunteer their time to assist others, knowing if they help another, they may expect assistance from others in return. This concept alone is in sharp contrast to today's "dog-eat-dog" corporate culture. Basically, Masons learn a little kindness can go a long way.

Negotiation Skills - in order to persuade people to move in a specific direction, Lodge officers must learn how to negotiate with others. Such skills are vital not only in our professional lives but also in our personal lives as well.

Sociologists who have studied Freemasonry have admitted that Freemasonry "takes a good man and makes him better." No, the fraternity is not intended to teach us business skills, but surprisingly it does nevertheless. Nor do I believe anyone joins the fraternity for this purpose. Regardless, these are some of the subliminal perks associated with the fraternity which does, in fact, add value to our lives as well as others we come in contact with.
